

HOME-BASED CTE

- We will no longer use the term "Virtual Learning" in our conversation and rather consider "Home-Based CTE" as our definition for distance education.
- We want to not dwell on "seat time" or "computer time" but now try to tie in active learning to the student's home-based experience
- Through our week-about system, we are dividing our face-to-face student body in half providing instructors with a more manageable student body within the COVID environment.
- We will be releasing most students, including drivers, at 2:00 pm each day giving instructors more prep time for Home-Based CTE at the end of the day.
- We will be initiating a school-wide early dismissal on Wednesdays at 12:30 pm providing dedicated time for instructors to interface with students on Home-Based CTE.
- We will be separating CMS students, adult students and visitors from our general student population.
- We are ordering the following additional resources, among others, to support Home-Based CTE efforts;
 - a. Purchasing additional devices and internet access for students.
 - b. Improving our VPN and internal tech system to allow for improved connection with students.
 - c. Purchasing additional software and computer platforms for you to use with Home-Based CTE.
 - d. Purchasing video equipment and related software providing opportunities for the videotaping of lessons.
 - e. Purchasing equipment allowing teachers to employ mobile livestreaming of program activities that can be shared with Home-Based CTE students.
- We will engage parents as soon as possible regarding Home-Based CTE and obtain ideas regarding handson activities that are available for students at home.
- We communicate with students using methods that students will most readily recognize (ie. Remind App).
- We will use technology to connect groups of students for research projects and discussion sessions promoting active learning opportunities and collaboration amongst students.
- We need to consider using the Home-Based CTE week to convey most of the necessary instructional theory allowing more time for face-to-face, practical training while at school.
- We will utilize work-based opportunities that will be developed through our school for Home-Based CTE students
- We will require student logs for the reporting of active experiences.
- We will utilize available resources to videotape or livestream to Home-Based CTE students what is
 occurring in the classroom.
- We will think about how students can "research to learn" through assignments.
